Education Week This week is Education Week for all NSW Department of Education schools. The theme of this year's celebration is 'Creating futures - education changes lives'. Our school continues to celebrate the journey students and learners take throughout the NSW Education system, focusing on how we are creating futures for our students, staff and families. From the first days in child care to post-school pathways, our education system is preparing young people to be agile thinkers and lifelong learners. We celebrate all types of learning that occurs at all levels across our education system and we have a shared responsibility in helping to shape the lives and create the future of today's learners. Public education can change the lives of not just our students, but also the lives of our teachers, staff, families and communities. During the week, we have lots of family friendly events planned to celebrate the great achievements of our students and school. Today our students enjoyed a live stream of the NED Show and our K-2 assembly. Tomorrow, 22 students will present speeches at our Public Speaking assembly. Eight students, two from each stage, will then be selected to represent our school at the Maitland Zone Public Speaking competition, scheduled for Week 6. On Friday we are inviting our parents and carers to come to school for a whole school assembly, starting at 10am, that will feature the presentation of Education Week achievement awards and student performances. After the brief assembly, our families are invited to join in a fun Zumba activity and then visit classrooms, where every student will be presented with a certificate. Parents and carers are then invited to stay for lunch, our Canteen manager Bec will be offering a meal deal option for families and students. We hope you can join us!

Parent Teacher Interviews Student reports have been sent home and, this week, our teachers are offering interviews with parents and carers. Please be reminded that, if you are unable to attend the face-to-face interviews, our teachers are able to offer phone interviews as an alternative.

Young Archies - Art Competition Information about our Young Archies art competition has been sent home with students. The competition, which invites our artists to create a portrait of an important person in their life, has proven to be extremely popular in recent years. In last week's newsletter I suggested that only painted portraits would be accepted. We have since loosened the restrictions to enable students to use a range of mediums to create their masterpiece! The winning entries will receive art supplies to encourage and support their budding skills.

Annual School Report Each year our school reports on our achievements and performance in a range of school operation areas. The Annual School Report (ASR) reports against school and system generated targets. A mandatory performance target for all public schools is student growth and attainment. NAPLAN performance continues to represent the common measure of student performance. Pleasingly, we were able to meet our targets in Reading and Numeracy. To provide clarification about our school's performance, 50% of our students are placed in the top two NAPLAN bands (proficiency) for NAPLAN Reading. This is an outstanding achievement and one that places our school near the very top of school performance in the area. Start your day with breakfast

Breakfast refuels your body, ready for the day!



Kids who eat breakfast have more energy to be physically active. They can concentrate, problem solve and focus better at school.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- · Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment.
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

 Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.


